## PETAL Pusher

Urban Petals owner Sarah von Pollaro, who launches a new flower subscription service this month, shares how to make your home garden-party ready.

Lush moss and violet floral centerpieces that mimic miniature gardens at a National Building Museum gala; orchids suspended above dinner tables at a Hirshhorn Museum bash; massive mum balls dressing up the tent at The Kennedy Center's Mark Twain Awards dinner. The flower arrangements designer Sarah von Pollaro creates for big-ticket events around town come across like bits of floral alchemy, as if an enchanted glade from A Midsummer Night's Dream magically appeared in a ballroom.

"It's a dream job, getting paid to think of cool decor for fabulous parties," says von Pollaro, whose DC-based company, **Urban Petals**, also donates all the arrangements from her events to local charities after the revelers go home. "It's empowering to pull up at a hospital or a homeless shelter with a bunch of flowers for the residents," she says.

Von Pollaro also believes in blending a mod garden aesthetic into her home design. "You can use furniture and accessories to create a room in your backyard," she says. "And pieces that seem made for your garden—a rattan sofa, a glazed pot—can make the inside of your house feel rustic and warm." She extolls the indoor-outdoor split personalities of teak, iron and even concrete. "I don't think of things as being just one purpose," she says. "You can even move things in and out of your home."

Flowers and plants, of course, play a starring role in von Pollaro's home and at her own parties. "I love to have succulents, ferns and orchids inside my house," she says. "It's like a happy greenhouse." And when she entertains, she often thinks outside the vase. "I'll put a bunch of peonies in a Champagne bucket or cut ferns from the garden and put them in vases," she says.

This month, von Pollaro launches a new floral subscription service, **SVP Flowers**, where, for \$50 every two weeks, clients get a ready-to-arrange bundle of seasonal blooms and greenery.
